5/16/2018	Control Substances - The bill addresses opioid abuse by expanding the use of the Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (PDMP), increasing regulation of prescribers and dispensers, and amending criminal laws. It limits the prescription for a Schedule II opioid for acute pain and requires regulatory boards to adopt guidelines for prescribing controlled substances for acute pain. It requires a health care practitioner to review a patient's PDMP history prior to dispensing a controlled substance. It authorizes a dispensing practitioner to provide medication-assisted treatment for substance abuse disorders to dispense Schedule II and III substances for such purpose and expands the reporting requirement to include certain Schedule V substances. It allows direct access to the PDMP for employees of certain federal agencies who prescribe or dispense controlled substances and allows DOH to share and exchange PDMP data with other states under certain conditions. It also makes it a crime to illegally possess, purchase, deliver, or sell a tableting machine, encapsulating machine, or controlled substance counterfeiting material.
