

Workforce Estimating Conference Summary

March 4, 2004 Room 1707 Turlington Building Tallahassee, Florida

<u>Targeted Occupations List/ Uses, Concepts, and Impact</u> – Uses of the Targeted Occupations List include targeting occupations for Individual Training Accounts (ITA) under the Workforce Investment Act, performance based funding for vocational centers and community colleges, and targeting jobs for special initiatives in education, training, and economic development.

The Workforce Estimating Conference's primary focus was to identify occupations suitable for Individual Training Accounts (ITA) and recognize occupations, which could be considered high wage/high demand occupations. Jobs that are to be targeted should have sufficient numbers of permanent openings and employment growth to assure ample job opportunities to justify training, meaning they meet an established openings and growth criteria.

Jobs targeted for an ITA should have an average wage high enough to assure career growth after initial employment and low enough to include good 'ports of entry'. They should also have an entry-level wage high enough to assure initial employment is above the poverty wage.

Jobs to be recognized as high wage/high demand occupations should have an average wage and entry-level wage high enough to justify a designation of a "high wage job" and faster-than-average growth with significant annual openings.

The criteria that was recommended and approved for the 2004-2005 Statewide Targeted Occupations Lists were as follows:

Demand -

- At least 50 annual openings with faster-than-average growth (1.96% based on 2011 projections), or
- At least 100 annual openings and evidence of positive growth

High Wage -

- Average wage at least \$16.85 (average wage of all occupations requiring an associates degree or post-secondary training), and
- Entry wage at least \$10.74 (Lower Living Standard Income Level for a family of three for the south metro area)

All ITA -

- Average wage at least \$10.74 (Lower Living Standard Income Level for a family of three for the south metro area), and
- Entry wage at least \$9.00

The items that are to be researched/reviewed prior to the next Workforce Estimating Conference meeting are: wage indexing and the impact of Scripps.

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216.136 Consensus estimating conferences; duties and principals.--

- (9) WORKFORCE ESTIMATING CONFERENCE.--
- (a) Duties.--
- 1. The Workforce Estimating Conference shall develop such official information on the workforce development system planning process as it relates to the personnel needs of current, new, and emerging industries as the conference determines is needed by the state planning and budgeting system. Such information, using quantitative and qualitative research methods, must include at least: short-term and long-term forecasts of employment demand for jobs by occupation and industry; entry and average wage forecasts among those occupations; and estimates of the supply of trained and qualified individuals available or potentially available for employment in those occupations, with special focus upon those occupations and industries which require high skills and have high entry wages and experienced wage levels. In the development of workforce estimates, the conference shall use, to the fullest extent possible, local occupational and workforce forecasts and estimates.
- 2. The Workforce Estimating Conference shall review data concerning the local and regional demands for short-term and long-term employment in High-Skills/High-Wage Program jobs, as well as other jobs, which data is generated through surveys conducted as part of the state's Internet-based job matching and labor market information system authorized under s. 445.011. The conference shall consider such data in developing its forecasts for statewide employment demand, including reviewing the local and regional data for common trends and conditions among localities or regions which may warrant inclusion of a particular occupation on the statewide occupational forecasting list developed by the conference. Based upon its review of such survey data, the conference shall also make recommendations semiannually to Workforce Florida, Inc., on additions or deletions to lists of locally targeted occupations approved by Workforce Florida, Inc.
- 3. During each legislative session, and at other times if necessary, the Workforce Estimating Conference shall meet as the Workforce Impact Conference for the purpose of determining the effects of legislation related to the state's workforce and economic development efforts introduced prior to and during such legislative session. In addition to the designated principals of the impact conference, nonprincipal participants of the impact conference shall include a representative of the Florida Chamber of Commerce and other interested parties. The impact conference shall use both quantitative and qualitative research methods to determine the impact of introduced legislation related to workforce and economic development issues.
- 4. Notwithstanding subparagraph 3., the Workforce Estimating Conference, for the purposes described in subparagraph 1., shall meet no less than 2 times in a calendar year. The first meeting shall be held in February and the second meeting shall be held in August. Other meetings may be scheduled as needed.
- (b) *Principals.*--The Commissioner of Education, the Executive Office of the Governor, the director of the Office of Tourism, Trade, and Economic Development, the director of the Agency for Workforce Innovation, the Chancellor of the State University System, the Executive Director of the State Board of Community Colleges, the chair of the State Board of Nonpublic Career Education, the chair of Workforce

Florida, Inc., the coordinator of the Office of Economic and Demographic Research, or their designees, and professional staff from the Senate and the House of Representatives who have forecasting and substantive expertise, are the principals of the Workforce Estimating Conference. In addition to the designated principals of the conference, nonprincipal participants of the conference shall include a representative of the Florida Chamber of Commerce and other interested parties. The principal representing the Executive Office of the Governor shall preside over the sessions of the conference.

216.134 Consensus estimating conferences; general provisions.--

- (1) Each consensus estimating conference shall develop such official information within its area of responsibility as the conference determines, by consensus, is needed for purposes of the state planning and budgeting system. Unless otherwise provided by law or decided by unanimous agreement of the principals of the conference, all official information developed by the conference shall be based on the assumption that current law and current administrative practices will remain in effect throughout the period for which the official information is to be used. The official information developed by each consensus estimating conference shall include forecasts for a period of at least 10 years, unless the principals of the conference unanimously agree otherwise.
- (2) Whenever an estimating conference is convened, an official estimate does not exist until a new consensus is reached.
- (3) The official information developed by the Economic Estimating Conference and the official information developed by the Demographic Estimating Conference shall be used by all other consensus estimating conferences in developing their official information.
- (4) The membership of each consensus estimating conference consists of principals and participants.
- (a) A person designated by law as a principal may preside over conference sessions, convene conference sessions, request information, specify topics to be included on the conference agenda, agree or withhold agreement on whether information is to be official information of the conference, release official information of the conference, interpret official information of the conference, and monitor errors in official information of the conference.
- (b) A participant is any person who is invited to participate in the consensus estimating conference by a principal. A participant shall, at the request of any principal before or during any session of the conference, develop alternative forecasts, collect and supply data, perform analyses, or provide other information needed by the conference. The conference shall consider information provided by participants in developing its official information.
- (5) All sessions and meetings of a consensus estimating conference shall be open to the public as provided in chapter 286.







Florida Nonagricultural Employment by Industry December 2003



December 2003



Professional and Business Services Gains More Jobs Than Any Other Industry in the State (Over the Year)








Florida Average Annual Wages Range from \$36,548 to \$21,333







Average Annual Wage



Employment Projections and Wages Program Updates/Changes

- Industry employment projections are the final forecast based on the Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) System.
- Occupational data are now collected twice a year to eliminate any seasonality in the data.
- Residual occupations, known as the "All Other" occupations, are no longer listed on the survey form.

Trends Impacting the Florida Economy

- Slower population growth
- Aging of the baby boomers with changing demands (2011:47-65)
- Echo boomers enter age cohorts with greater spending power: (2011: 19-38)



- Everglades Restoration Project will affect employment in South Florida
- Both lower-skilled and high-tech jobs moving to other countries
- Recent passage of several constitutional amendments will impact employment growth

Industry Employment Projections

- Employment in Florida is projected to gain 1,291,000 new jobs by 2011, increasing employment to 9,452,000 jobs.
- Total employment for 2011 is just 0.9 percent higher than the level projected for 2010.
- All major industry divisions, except mining are projected to gain employment.

- Annual employment growth over the next
 8 years will average 1.96 percent.
- All major industries divisions, except construction are projected to grow at the same or slower rate than previously forecasted.
- One out of every two new jobs will continue to be in the services industry.

- Within the services industry, business and health services will account for 61 percent of the new jobs.
- Employment growth in manufacturing will be small (0.32%), with instruments and related products, fabricated metal products, and transportation equipment showing the strongest job gains.

- Retail trade is projected to grow at the same rate as previously forecasted. A weaker forecast for eating and drinking places and food stores is offset by a stronger outlook for building materials, general merchandise stores, and miscellaneous retail stores.
- Construction employment is projected to grow faster than previously forecasted as changes in demographics create an increased demand for residential housing.

- Government employment, is projected to grow slower than the average growth rate for all industries, with 85 percent of the new jobs to be at the local government level.
- Self-employed workers will account for 3.2 percent of all the new jobs.

Industry Employment Projections What's Changed

- The outlook for the computer and data processing services industry was lowered by 13,000 jobs due to weak demand for services and jobs moving to other countries.
- Overcapacity in grocery stores results in 12,400 fewer projected jobs.


Industry Employment Projections What's Changed (continued)

- Impacts of 9/11 and a restructuring by the airline industry has lowered the projection for air transportation by 12,600 jobs.
- The class size amendment and increased student enrollments gave reason to boost the forecast for elementary and secondary schools by 24,000 jobs.

Industry Employment Projections What's Changed (continued)

- Recent strong growth in management consulting firms caused an additional 15,700 jobs to be forecasted for this industry.
- Continued growth in construction prompted an increase the employment for lumber and other building material dealers by 7,400 jobs.
- The mandatory availability of pre-K4 warranted an increase in the forecast for child care services by 4,100 jobs.

Occupational Employment Projections

- Much of the occupational employment growth will occur in the trade and service industries, which will generate nearly 71 percent of the new jobs in Florida.
- All 23 major occupational groups are projected to grow, but many will grow at a slower rate than previously forecasted.

Occupational Employment Projections (cont.)

- Computer and healthcare occupations will continue to grow the fastest, while clerical and sales occupations will gain the most new jobs.
- 8 of the 10 fastest-growing occupations require postsecondary training below the baccalaureate degree.
- In many occupations, more job openings will be due to replacement needs rather than economic growth.


Occupational Employment Projections What's Changed

- Stronger growth trends projected for construction, make the projections for electricians, carpenters, and construction laborers increase by a combined total of 8,300 jobs.
- The outlook for elementary, middle and secondary school teachers has been increased by a combined total of an additional 25,000 jobs.


Occupational Employment Projections What's Changed (continued)

- The forecasts for computer support specialists, systems analysts, and database administrators, have been reduced by a combined total of 22,000 jobs.
- The projection for telemarketers has been reduced by only 1,600 jobs due to limited data on the impact of the National Do Not Call List.

Occupational Wages

- The overall weighted average wage in Florida is \$16.36 per hour. This is an increase of 4.1 percent from the overall average wage (\$15.71) used as the high wage criteria for the last Workforce Estimating Conference.
- The 2003 overall weighted entry wage in Florida is \$10.57, up just 1.7 percent from the 2002 wage of \$10.39.


Occupational Wages (continued)

- Wages for all major occupational groups, except social service, personal care, and agricultural occupations, have increased since the last Workforce Estimating Conference.
- Managerial, health care, and legal occupations have experienced the greatest numerical increase in average wages.


Occupational Wages (continued)

- Managerial, health care, and health support occupations have experienced the greatest percentage increase in average wages.
- The 2003 Lower Living Standard Income Level (LLSIL), used as the high wage entry criteria, is \$10.74, up 2.6 percent from the 2002 level of \$10.48.
- The 2003 average for all occupations requiring an associate's degree or postsecondary training is \$18.01 for the mean and \$11.58 for the entry wage.

Targeted Jobs - Criteria

- Jobs that require postsecondary education/training less than baccalaureate degrees – there are problems with the codes – so some supplementation is proposed:
 - Some occupations identified by the codes as "requiring OJT but no formal training" are not correct
 - Some occupations identified as requiring < than baccalaureate levels of education require at least that
 - Some occupations identified as requiring < than baccalaureate require no training at all
 - LMI data are used for the selections, however, the WEC in the past has sanctioned the use of FETPIP data where there is evidence of high volumes/proportions of placements and earnings consistent with the WEC criteria.



Occupational Education and Training Requirement Categories As defined by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics

- **1—First professional degree.** These are occupations that require a professional degree. Completion of the academic program usually requires at least 6 years of full-time equivalent academic work, including college study prior to entering the professional degree program.
- **2—Doctoral degree.** These are occupations that generally require a Ph.D. or other degree. Completion of the degree program usually requires at least 3 years of full-time equivalent academic work beyond the bachelor's degree.
- **3—Master's degree.** These are jobs that generally require a master's degree. Completion of the degree program usually requires 1 or 2 years of full-time equivalent work beyond the bachelor's degree.
- **4—Work experience, plus a bachelor's degree or higher.** These are occupations that generally require work experience in an occupation requiring a bachelor's or higher degree. Most occupations in this category are managerial occupations that require experience in a related non-managerial position.
- **5—Bachelor's degree.** These are jobs that generally require a bachelor's degree. Completion of the degree program generally requires at least 4 years, but not more than 5 years, of full-time equivalent academic work.
- **6—Associate's degree.** These are occupations that generally require an associate's degree. Completion of the degree program generally requires at least 2 years of full-time equivalent academic work.
- **7—Post-secondary vocational training.** These are jobs that generally require completion of vocational school training. Some programs last only a few weeks while others may last up to two years. In some occupations, a license is needed that requires passing an examination after completion of the training.
- **8—Work experience in a related occupation.** These are jobs that generally require skills obtained through work experience in an occupation. Some occupations requiring work experience are supervisory or managerial occupations.
- **9—Long-term on-the-job training.** These are jobs that generally require more than 12 months of on-the-job training or experience and formal classroom instruction for workers to develop the skills needed for average job performance. This category includes formal and informal apprenticeships that may last up to 4 years and short-term intensive employer-sponsored training that workers successfully complete. Individuals undergoing training are considered "employed" in the occupation. This category includes occupations in which workers may gain experience through non-work activities.
- **10—Moderate-term on-the-job training.** These are occupations in which workers can develop the skills needed for average job performance after 1 to 12 months of combined on-the-job experience and informal training.
- **11—Short-term on-the-job training.** These are occupations in which workers generally can develop the skills needed for average job performance after a short demonstration or up to 1 month of on-the-job experience and instruction.







Import/Export Ratio: 2 Freshmen come in for every 1 who leaves





Fewer In-State Students are Leaving






