# Student Financial Aid Enrollment Estimating Conference <br> Monday, November 15, 2004 <br> 1:30 p.m., 2103 Capital

The student financial aid conference reviews data presented to the principals and consensus numbers of students served and awards made.

Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program - Theresa Antworth and Beth Lines use different methodologies to prepare their calculations and the reported results of different approaches were similar numbers. At the March 2004 conference, the principals agreed to a total count of 125,101 eligible students for the 2004-05 academic year. At the November 15, 2004, conference, the principals agreed to the latest projection of 129,540 eligible students for 2004-05. The increased projection of 4,439 students primarily reflects a retention rate above that previously projected as well as a change in the university/community college reward mix for the Florida Medallion Scholars award level. The conference adopted an estimated 137,757 Bright Future awards for 2005-06.

Florida Student Assistance Grants (FSAG) - Some postsecondary schools have not reported due to scheduling and delays from the hurricanes. FSAG is a prorated appropriation and the appropriation will be spent, but the individual award amount is below the maximum award amount. The conference accepted the FSAG 2004-05 number of awards at 107,103 and adopted 113,912 awards for 2005-06.

Critical Teacher Shortage - The appropriated amount for 2004-05 has been fully expended awarding a prorated amount to eligible applicants of $22 \%$ of the maximum award amount. The tuition reimbursement award is prorated so that all eligible applicants receive funds instead of the full award amount disbursed on a first come, first serve basis. A projection of applicants for 2005-06 is difficult due to the variables of designated critical areas and the number of teacher applicants. The 2004-05 percentage growth was applied and the conference adopted the 2005-06 estimate of Tuition Reimbursement awards at 4,334 course hours and Loan Forgiveness awards at 2,666 applicants.

Florida Resident Access Grant - 2004-05 disbursements are not expected to reach the appropriated amount. A three-year growth average was applied to the estimates and the conference adopted 32,176 awards for 2004-05 and 32,915 awards for 2005-06.

Access to Better Learning and Education (ABLE) - Current information for 2004-05 indicates 620 students will receive the full award amount of \$1,500. The schools expect to fully expend all the funds. If the Legislature keeps the 2004 proviso language the same, ten additional institutions would be added for the 2005-06 academic year. If additional funding is not considered, the award amount would be prorated to cover all eligible students. The conference adopted an estimated 3,115 eligible students for ABLE for 2005-06.

## EDR Estimate and Projection for Bright Futures November 9, 2004 SFA Estimating Conference

EDR estimates that FY 2004-05 Bright Futures costs will exceed the appropriation by about $\$ 7.9$ million, based on new information available from fiscal year-end reports for FY 2003-04. EDR METHODOLOGY explains the changes.

EDR's projection for FY 2005-06, without tuition increases, is about $\mathbf{\$ 2 9 2}$ million, or about $\mathbf{\$ 2 3 . 5}$ million over the FY 2004 -05 level. Summary information is shown below, with detail by fiscal year on the attached sheets.
EDR METHODOLOGY:
The EDR model is based on survival rates, by award and type of institution (4-yr/2-yr) observed in the most recent FINAL fiscal year.
In the MARCH 2004 conference, EDR used FY 2002-03 values adjusted for Term 1 FY 2003-04 data.
For this conference, EDR used the actual values from the FY 2003-04 FINAL tape.
Generally, the survival rates were HIGHER than the March 2004 rates, particularly for Medallion and Gold Seal awards.
Higher survival rates generally mean higher costs.
The EDR model takes into account transfers between 2-yr and 4-yr institutions. EDR also models transfers from Academic Scholars
and from Gold Seals to Medallion Scholars, and from Gold Seals to Medallion Scholars.
Generally, rates of transfer from 2-yr to 4-yr institutions were HIGHER than the March 2004 rates for 2nd-yr Academic Scholars.
In addition, transfers from Academic to Medallion Scholars were LOWER than the March 2004 rates.
Higher rates of transfers from lower cost institutions to higher cost institutions mean higher costs.
Lower rates of transfer from higher-priced Academic to lower-priced Medallion awards means higher costs.
EDR estimate assumes the same distribution of INITIAL students between 4-year and 2-year institutions as in FY 2003-04 FINAL tape.
EDR projection holds INITIAL AWARDS in FY 2004-05 at the same level as the MARCH 2004 CONSENSUS.
This is consistent with the number of 12th grade FTE in FY $2003-04$ at graduation rates observed in FY 2002-03 (most recent data).
EDR projection for FY 2005-06 uses 28\% of the number of high school graduate estimates prepared by DOE (May 2004 report).
EDR cost estimates for both years assume same number of hours per award as FY 2003-04 actual hours per award.

Principals include the Commissioner of Education (who presides over the conference), the Executive Office of the Governor, the coordinator of the Office of Economic and Demographic Research, and professional staff of the Senate and House of Representatives with forecasting expertise, or their designees.

Duties include the development of the number of students qualified for state financial aid programs and for the William L. Boyd, IV, Florida Resident Access Grant and Access to Better Learning and Education programs, and the appropriation required to fund the full award amounts for each program.

The five programs that will be reviewed are:

- the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program
- the Florida Student Assistance Grants
- the Critical Teacher Shortage Programs
- the William L. Boyd, IV, Florida Resident Access Grant
- the Access to Better Learning and Education


## Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program

## $\underline{2004-05}$

- In the March 2004 Estimating Conference, the consensus number of eligible Bright Futures students agreed upon by the principals was 125,101 students for 2004-05. The 2004 appropriation for these eligible students was $\$ 268,106,104$.
- The 2004-05 actual fall disbursed students, re-calculated for a final annual count, projects 129,540 students with a projected expenditure of $\$ 275,989,784$. This reflects an appropriation shortfall of $\$ 7,883,680$.
- There was an increased number of renewing Florida Medallion students this year.


## $\underline{2005-06}$

- The 2005-06 DOE LBR requested $\$ 297,700,000$ for 126,000 students. The recalculated 2005-06 projections using 2003-04 End of Year data, projects an annual student count of 137,757 (renewal growth and annual increases in eligible HS graduates) with a projected budget of $\$ 292,310,647$ assuming no tuition and fees increase. This is $\$ 5.3$ million lesser than the LBR.
- The projected cost for a tuition \& fees increase is $\$ 2.8$ million per percentage
increase. This breaks out to $\$ 2.5$ million for state universities and $\$ .3$ million for community colleges (EDR Estimation).


## Florida Student Assistance Grants

## $\underline{2004-05}$

- In the March 2004 Estimating Conference, the consensus number of eligible in the Florida Student Assistance Grant (FSAG) students agreed upon by the principals was 107,103 need-based students for 2004-05. The 2004 appropriation for these eligible students was increased by $5.7 \%$ to $\$ 90,604,629$ to accommodate public tuition and fee increases. In addition, the maximum award increased from \$1,491 to \$1,592 to accommodate this increase.
- The state participates in federal need-based matching programs (Leveraging Educational Assistance Partnership and Special Leveraging Educational Assistance Partnership (LEAP and SLEAP)) and combines these $\$ 2.1$ million awarded funds with the FSAG programs.
- The 2004-05 current fall student count is 81,171 (a break out of disbursed 69,120 and 12,051 otherwise eligible). The disbursements of $\$ 40,770,777$ represent expected expenditures at $88 \%$ for the term and $45 \%$ for the year. Many participating institutions have extended reporting this year due to hurricane interruptions and many Postsecondary schools reports are not yet due.
- The average award in 2004-05 is expected to be less than the maximum of $\$ 1,592$. (Public = \$1,196; Private = \$1,100; and Postsecondary = \$1,138 (many awards are not in for the Postsecondary sector to calculate a good average)).
- In comparison, the 2003-04 average full time award was Public $=\$ 987$; Private $=$ $\$ 957$; and Postsecondary = \$700.


## $\underline{2005-06}$

- The 2005-06 DOE LBR was for $\$ 121,499,555$ to fund 130,586 unduplicated students.
- Readjusted 2005-06 projections from the 2003-04 Actual End of Year Report decreases the number of projected FTE students to 113,912.
- The appropriation needed to award each eligible student the full award $(\$ 1,592)$ would be $\$ 161.4$ million. This represents a $\$ 39.9$ million above the LBR.
- The amount to fund all eligible students at the 2004-05 preliminary average award per sector would be $\$ 119.2$ million, representing $\$ 2.3$ million below the LBR.
- The amount to fund all eligible students at the 2004-05 preliminary average award with a $2.5 \%$ cost increase would be $\$ 122.1$ million, representing $\$ .6$ million above the LBR.


## Critical Teacher Shortage Programs

## 2004-05

- In the March 2004 Estimating Conference, the consensus for the number of eligible 2004-05 Critical Teacher Shortage Tuition Reimbursement participants was 1,303, and Loan Forgiveness teachers was 1,948. The 2004 appropriation for these eligible participants was level funded at $\$ 1,739,566$.
- The 2004-05 actual eligible participant count, as of November 5, 2004, is 1,332 (times 3 hours for a total hour count of 3,998) for Tuition Reimbursement and 2,370 for Loan Forgiveness, an increase in both programs.
- The awards have been prorated to approximately $22 \%$ of the maximum allowed in order to fund each eligible applicant. The entire appropriation will be expended awarding tuition reimbursement at $\$ 17$ instead of $\$ 78$ per credit hour, and for loan forgiveness undergraduates $\$ 550$ instead of $\$ 2,500$ and for graduates $\$ 1,110$ instead of $\$ 5,000$.


## 2005-06

- The 2005-06 DOE LBR was for \$6,800,476 to serve a total of 3,569 participants.
- Based on 2004-05 actual disbursement percentage growth, a new projection of 200506 tuition reimbursement course hours and loan forgiveness participants reflects a new total of $\$ 8,779,053$ for fully funded hours and loans.


## Florida Resident Access Grant

## $\underline{2004-05}$

- In the March 2004 Estimating Conference, the consensus number of eligible William L. Boyd, IV, Florida Resident Access Grant (FRAG) students agreed upon by the principals was 33,700 students for 2004-05. The 2004 appropriation for these eligible students was level funded at $\$ 79,841,350$ with a full time award of $\$ 2,369$.
- The 2004-05 actual fall semester disbursed students as of November 5, 2004, is 31,456 with disbursement totals of $\$ 37,241,043$ (average fall award of $\$ 1,185$ or the annualized award of $\$ 2,369$ ).
- We anticipate that the number of funded students will increase with the Term 2 disbursements and late awardees to equate to the annual projected number of awardees.
- Based on current enrollments, we anticipate full awards for Term 2.


## $\underline{2005-06}$

- The 2005-06 DOE LBR was for $\$ 81,677,136$ for 34,475 students. Based on 2003-04 End of Year student counts and the three-year average growth increase of 2.58\%, the projected number of eligible students for 2005-06 would increase to 34,807.
- An award equal to the 2004-05 full award of $\$ 2,369$ would require $\$ 82,457,783$, a \$780,647 increase to the 2005-06 LBR amount.


## Access to Better Learning and Education

## $\underline{2004-05}$

The 2003 Legislature passed s. 1009.891 F.S., to create a tuition assistance program for students attending independent for-profit colleges and universities. The 2004-05 General Appropriations Act funded \$1,800,000 for the Access to Better Learning and Education (ABLE) program.

- For the 2004-05 fall semester, only one of the three eligible institutions have completed the reporting activities. Their report is consistent with the projections of 620 eligible students.
- Estimated unused funds in 2004-05 are projected to be \$870,000.


## 2005-06

- The 2005-06 DOE LBR was for level funding at $\$ 1,800,000$ for 1,200 students.
- The projected number of eligible students for 2005-06 could increase to 3,115 with the addition of the second year of ten additional eligible institutions and their eligible students. This would then require an increased budget of $\$ 2,872,500$ for a total request of $\$ 4,672,500$ to accommodate all thirteen schools.
- Without additional funding, the award would need to be prorated from the maximum amount of $\$ 1,500$ to $\$ 577.85$ per eligible student.
