

## **SB 1296 – Abuse of a Parent (Identical HB 1137)**

This bill creates s. 790.233, F.S., adding seven unranked felony offenses related to aggravated battery, aggravated assault, false imprisonment, or exploitation of a parent by their child (under 18 years of age). Ranked offenses currently exist for aggravated battery, aggravated assault, false imprisonment, aggravated abuse of the elderly or disabled with great bodily harm, permanent disability, or permanent disfigurement, as well as various monetary thresholds determining the severity of exploitation of the elderly or disabled adult. **See handout.**

Additionally, this bill creates a potential for diversion from prison: “upon request of the state attorney or defense attorney, the court may reduce a felony charge to a misdemeanor and provide alternative sentencing. Such alternative sentencing may include, but is not limited to, probation or required attendance in specialized intervention programs.”

Per DOC, in FY 14-15, there were 61 (adj.) offenders under 18 years of age sentenced for aggravated assault, with 31 (adj.) of these offenders sentenced to prison (mean sentence length=65.0 m, incarceration rate: 50.8% adj.-51.1% unadj.). There were 52 (adj.) offenders under 18 years of age sentenced for aggravated battery, with 31 (adj.) of these offenders sentenced to prison (mean sentence length=68.0 m, incarceration rate: 59.6% adj.-60.0% unadj.). False imprisonment involves children under age 13, and only one person under 18 was sentenced for this offense, though that person did not receive a prison sentence. Nobody was sentenced for aggravated abuse of the elderly or exploiting elderly or disabled adults for their assets. It is unknown how many of the assault and battery offenses were committed against parents.

General versions of these offenses already exist, and are ranked higher than the new offenses. Also, the juvenile justice system and the opportunity for alternate sentencing described in this bill might lessen the impact of additional offenders entering prison.
