Workforce Estimating Conference September 7, 2012

The Workforce Estimating Conference met on September 7, 2012. The agenda included presentations from the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity, Labor Market Statistics Center regarding key factors affecting employment, an Industry and Occupational Forecast, and lists of Targeted Occupations by Educational Levels.

The Conference reviewed the proposed lists of occupations by education levels and agreed to increase the average and entry level wages for both the Bachelor's Degree and the Master's or Higher Degree demand lists by the Employment Cost Index (ECI), similar to what is done for the Post Secondary Adult Vocational (PSAV) and College Credit Certificate/Associate Degree (CCC/AD) demand list.

The Conference adopted all three 2013-2014 demand occupation lists. Occupations that were added to the 2013-2014 lists and deleted from the 2012-13 lists (August 2011 and February 2012) are also detailed. The three demand occupation lists are summarized below.

Employment Projections --Background

- Employment forecast covers the period 2012-2020
- Independent variables included national and Florida industry employment, population, personal income, unemployment rates, and housing starts
- Staffing patterns derived from the 2011 annual occupational survey, with over 55,000 employer responses representing more than 4.1 million workers, were used to produce the occupational projections


Employment Projections --Assumptions

- Florida population growth will be slower and is not forecast to return to pre-recession rates in the forecast period
- Long-term job growth is expected to be weaker due to:
 - A prolonged, sluggish recovery at the state and national levels
 - Continuing global financial and economic problems
- The unemployment rate is forecast to decline to 6.5 percent by 2020
- Entry level educational requirements for occupations will not change significantly



Industry Employment Demand to 2020 Highlights

- Florida is projected to gain more than one million new jobs between 2012 and 2020 (1.6% annual growth)
- The projected employment in 2020 is just over 9 million jobs
- Nearly 80 percent in this forecast will be the regaining of jobs lost during the recent economic downturn
- All major industry sectors will see employment gains, except information and natural resources and mining; however, only 5 of the 12 major industry sectors are projected to exceed their pre-recession employment peak
- Some industries hardest hit by job losses between 2007 and 2012 will experience more job gains over the long term and they will have above average growth rates as they regain some jobs from their lowest employment levels in a decade

- There are 2,586,721 projected total job openings, cumulative for the period 2012-2020:
 - 1,563,802 openings due to replacement need (Baby Boomers retiring)
 - 1,022,919 openings due to industry growth
- Of the 2,586,721 projected job openings:
 - 2,236,178 (86 percent) will require an Associate degree or less
 - 250,922 (10 percent) will require a Bachelor's degree
 - 99,621 (4 percent) will require a Master's degree or higher

Indexing Wage Thresholds Using the Employment Cost Index (ECI)

- The ECI is produced by the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics
- It is a quarterly measure of changes in labor costs
- The Workforce Estimating Conference uses an ECI that includes wages and salaries, all civilian workers for all occupational groups
- 2nd Quarter 2012 ECI = 115.8; 2nd Quarter 2011 ECI = 113.9
 - Annual percent change = 1.7 percent
 - Last year's change = 1.6 percent





2013-14 Statewide Demand List Occupational Criteria

- Requires postsecondary adult vocational training or a community college credit certificate, applied technology diploma, associate of applied science or associate degree using revised occupational training codes (2012-13 Criteria: same)
- Has 150 projected annual openings and a growth rate above the average growth rate for all occupations (1.55 percent) or 360 projected annual openings with any positive growth (2012-13 Criteria: growth rate 1.62%; openings same)
- Has a mean wage of at least \$13.29/hour and an entry wage of \$10.80/hour to be eligible for an Individual Training Account (2012-13 Criteria: mean wage \$13.07; entry wage \$10.62)
- Requires a mean wage of at least \$20.82/hour and entry wage of \$13.29/hour for a High Skill/High Wage designation (2012-13 Criteria: mean wage \$20.48; entry wage \$13.07)



2013-14 Statewide Demand List

- 87 occupations meet the 2013-14 occupational criteria (97 occupations met the 2012-13 criteria)
- 11 occupations were added to the 2013-14 list and 21 occupations on the 2012-13 list were dropped
- Primary reason for occupations being added to or dropped from the list:
 - Changes in projected growth rate for an occupation
 - Changes made to the occupation's entry wage
 - Addition of occupations from the new 2010 Standard Occupational Classification manual



2013-14 Statewide Demand List Jobs Requiring Bachelor's and Master's Degrees

- Jobs requiring a Bachelor's degree
 - 42 occupations meet the 2013-14 occupational criteria (38 occupations met the 2012-13 criteria)
 - 10 occupations were added to the 2013-14 list and 6 occupations on the 2012-13 list were dropped
- Jobs requiring a Master's degree and higher
 - 27 occupations meet the 2013-14 occupational criteria (24 occupations met the 2012-13 criteria)
 - 3 occupations were added to the 2013-14 list and no occupations on the 2012-13 list were dropped
